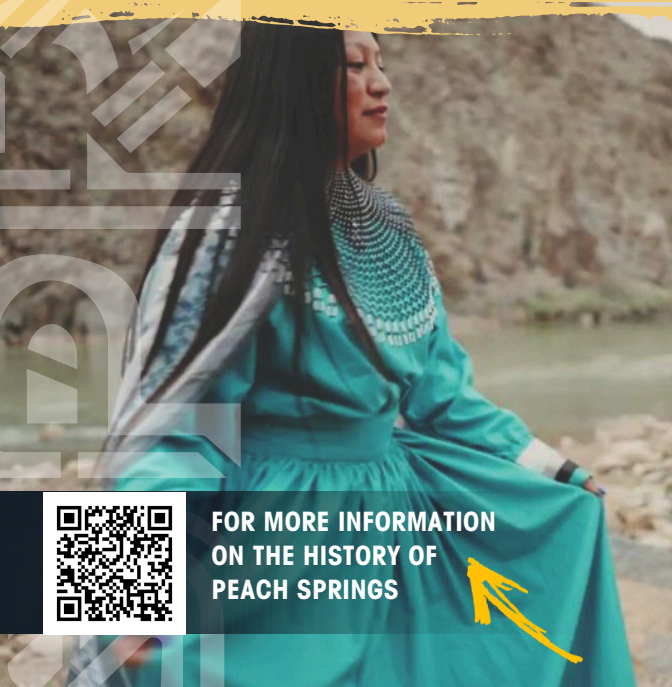


# THE TRIBE

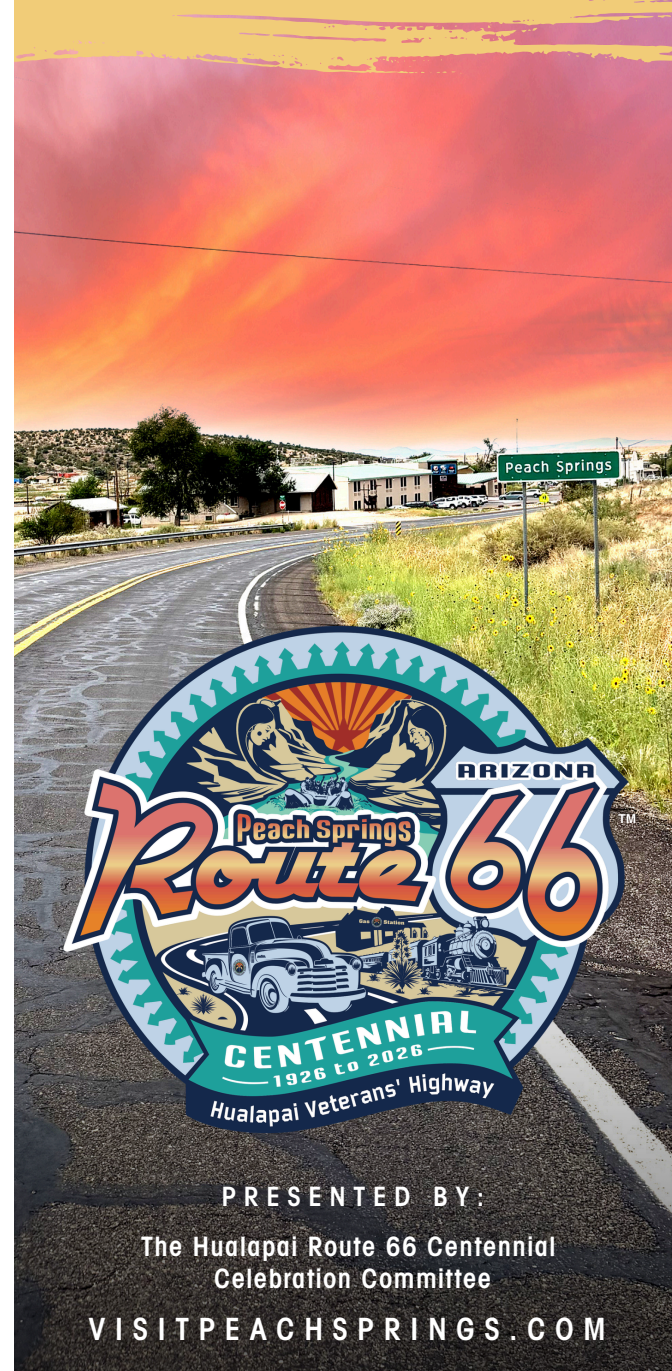

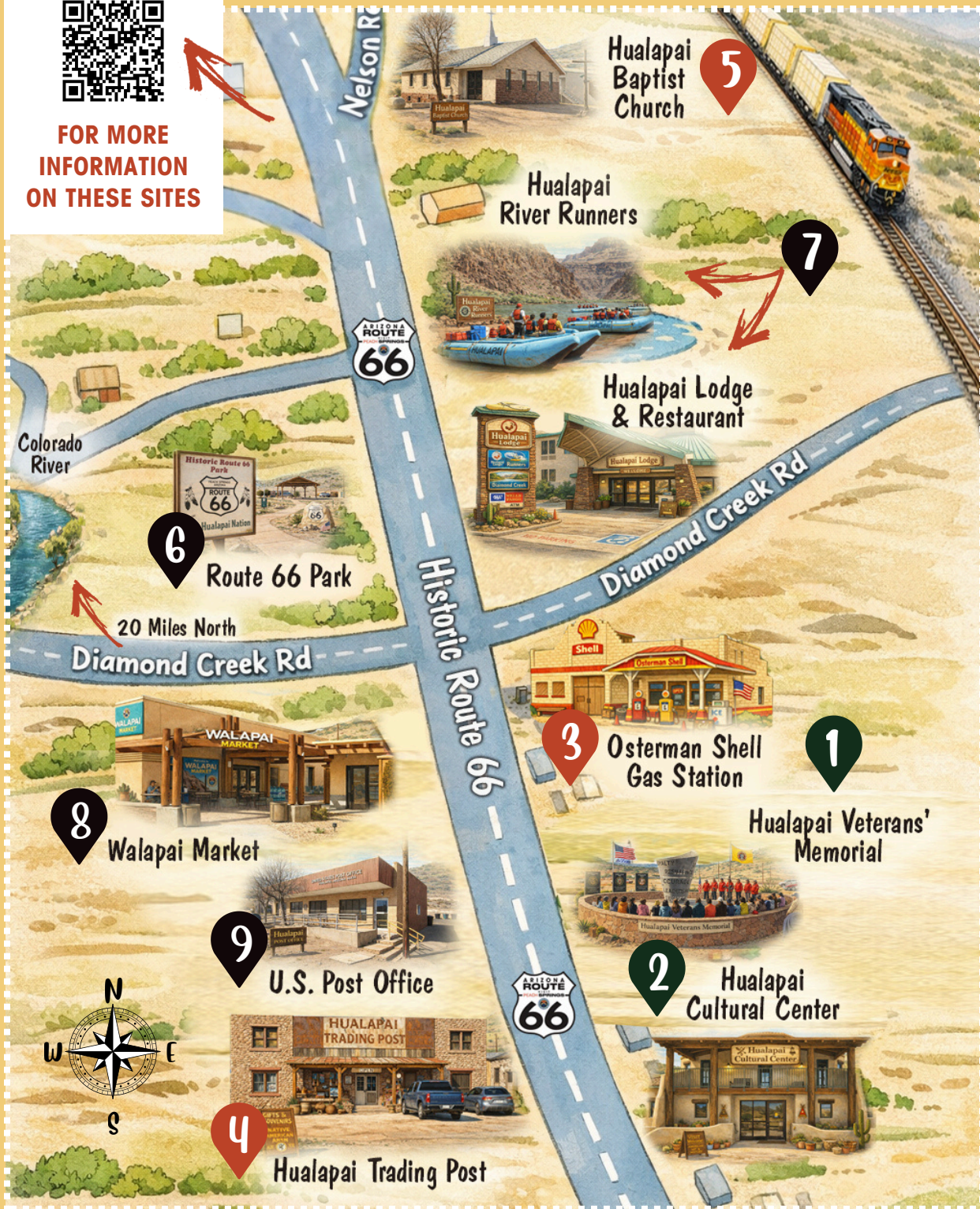

## CULTURAL SITES

### 1. Hualapai Veterans' Memorial

Dedicated in 2025, the memorial recognizes 286 tribal members whose military service dates from the late 19<sup>th</sup> Century. The half-acre site offers seating within the memorial as well along the perimeter for quiet reflection and respite. The central sculpture is inscribed with both Hualapai and English words that evoke the warrior spirit. The sculpture is illuminated night and day to symbolize the Eternal Flame.

### 2. Hualapai Cultural Center

Keepers of the tribe's customs and traditions, the Center offers collections for public viewing and a knowledgeable staff that provides informal tours. To keep the tribe's traditions at the forefront, the Center offers seasonal classes for making art, clothing, food preparation and language preservation.

### 3. Osterman "Shell" Gas Station

Built in 1929 with concrete blocks cast from a Sears block machine, the former gas station, Greyhound bus stop and social center of downtown is being restored by the tribe for the Centennial.

### 4. Hualapai Trading Post

Now home to the tribe's Game and Fish Department, where you can purchase a permit to drive down to the Colorado River, the 1928 stone building was a trading post until the early 1970s with gas sold from the adjoining building.

### 5. Hualapai Baptist Church

In operation since the 1930s, the church offers Sunday services at 9:00 AM

## LODGING, FOOD & SERVICES

### 6. Route 66 Park

Dedicated to Army veteran Dallas Quasula, the park provides the central location for tribal activities and vendors.

### 7. Hualapai Lodge, Restaurant & River Runners

The lodge has 55 rooms, familiar cuisine & ticketing for River Runners.

### 8. Walapai Market & "76"

The market offers a Starbucks coffee bar, bakery, butcher shop & fuel station.

### 9. U.S. Post Office

Last, but not least, the US Post Office operates from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM, M-F
